| 2. President Vlog & Questions | <p>President's Vlog was played.</p> <p>Q: How was it decided that the Guild of Students would campaign to remain in the European Union? A: Policy was passed in Guild Council last year which mandated the Guild to campaign to remain a member of the EU.</p> | <p>Noted</p> <p>Noted</p> |

ADO Vlog & Questions | <p>Activities & Development Officer's Vlog was played.</p> <p>Q: it was noted that there was a mention in the vlog about providing help to Group Executives, what exactly was meant by this? A: It was noted that the wording on this policy didn't express well what was meant by this. It was clarified that the policy would cover reducing the amount of admin that needed to be carried out by group executives and supporting them to carry out their roles effectively.</p> <p>Q: How many students are currently members of Guild Groups and Societies? EO Vlog & Questions | <p>Education Officer's Vlog was played.</p> <p>Q: The Amos Room had been booked as a revision space but during the exam period, there have been a number of times recently where it has not been opened in the morning, what is being done about this?</p> | <p>Noted</p> <p>Noted</p> <p>Officers to</p> |

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| | <p>A: Apologies if anyone has been affected by this, the Amos Room has been booked for the whole of the exam period for use as a revision space. It may be that the need to open the room has not been communicated to staff. This issue will be looked into.</p> <p>Q: What are the provisions for library access over the Summer period, when the old library will be being closed and books are transferred? A: Library services have increased the amount of books that can be taken out in 1 loan to 30 books. There will also be a twice daily book fetching service. Clarification of this was sent out in the latest Student Representative newsletter and library services have started to disseminate it more. The same provisions will exist for all libraries on the main campus. The main library will be closing on the 5th June</p> <p>Q: What provisions will be put in place for disabled students, who may not be able to carry large amounts of books with them to and from campus? A: Some larger reference books can be placed in rooms across campus; these books have to be requested in advance.</p> <p>Q: Would it be possible to have study spaces in the Guild over the Summer period as the library will not be available? A: This is an option that could be looked into, it was clarified that the Guild closes at 5pm out of term time. It was clarified that library services will be a priority for the new Education Officer and Officer Team.</p> <p>Q: What feedback does the EO have from the Universitas 21 Conference that was attended over the Easter Break? A: We learned a lot about different university representative structures that exist. Student Groups were managed by the University rather than the Guild. And the representative structures were less about campaigning on student issues and more focussed on academics.</p> <p>Q: Was there any student management of Representational or campaigning structures at universities in the USA? A: No, all of this was managed by the university. Whilst there was student involvement, they had no management or oversight of the processes.</p> <p>Q: Will the library's new loans extensions policy be available to all students A: Yes, the library's new loans policy will be open to all students, whilst the books are being transferred. The different libraries on campus will have slightly different closing dates. A: No, the Selly Oak campus library is not affected by the changes on main campus</p> <p>Q: How can 'fetching service' requests be made? A: Requests for the library fetching service can be made online in the usual way. | <p>5. HCO Vlog & Questions</p> | <p>Housing & Community Officer's Vlog was played.</p> <p>Q: Is there a list of 'dodgy' landlords that can be made available to students? A: No, although there used to be one, there is not one currently available. I am working with Student Bricks (a property rating service) at the moment, and there will be an option on that to rate landlords as soon as it is up and running.</p> <p>Q: Can more information be provided on the Open Air Cinema? A: Planning for that event is currently underway. It is scheduled to take place on the 2nd June on the Guild back lawn.</p> <p>Q: Will the event be fully accessible to those with disabilities? RRO Vlog & Questions</p> | <p>Representation and Resources Vlog was played.</p> <p>In an update to the Vlog, DL mentioned the international student buddy scheme, has been agreed by the University who will fund the initiative, this will mean that a new member of staff will start work at the Guild to manage the scheme.</p> <p>Q: Will the system for reporting sexual harassment on campus be anonymous? A: There is an option to make the submissions anonymous, but doing so may make it more difficult to follow up and track. Where submissions are anonymised, there will be an option for email advice to be provided.</p> <p>Q: Can more information be provided on the consent training that is planned? 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| | <p>Q: What action is being taken to ensure that this training does not come across as patronising to the student body? A: This is an understandable concern that has been raised with the university. Input is been given by a number of sources to make sure the training is relevant to all students.</p> <p>Q: Will the consent training be compulsory for all students to complete? A: The training will be compulsory in as much as the Guild and the University will say it's compulsory. We will not be able to track completion rates.</p> <p>Q: Can information be provided on how the reporting will work and who will answer all complaints? A: The service will be manned by 3 fully trained advisers from Student Services. If the report is not anonymised there will be an option for the reporting person to meet with the adviser. If not, then email support can be provided. The precise make up of this will be led by the individual student.</p> <p>Q: Will one of the advisers be from a BME background? A: This is something that can be looked into</p> <p>Q: Will the advisers be new members of staff or would they be existing members of staff with additional responsibilities? A: That has not been decided yet, but will be largely dependent on the training of members of staff; of course the precise make-up of the team will need to be reflective of the wider university society.</p> <p>Q: Who has been working on the consent training? A: The consent training has been worked on the Sexual Harassment Working Group to make sure that it is relevant to all students, from all backgrounds.</p> <p>Q: Will the ISA be able to feed into the buddy scheme that is being planned? WO Vlog & Questions</p> | <p>Welfare Officer's Vlog was played.</p> <p>Q: Can more funding be allocated to liberation history months to ensure that all liberation associations get the same level of funding? A: There is currently one sum of funding available for all liberation history celebrations, this has been increased slightly but is not currently ring-fenced, although this is something that is being worked on. However additional funding can be accessed via the Campaigns Pot.</p> <p>Q: Can more information be provided on the Campaigns Pot and how it is accessed? A: The Campaigns pot is a sum of money set aside to support student-led campaigns and initiatives. Proposals for funding can be submitted to the Student Voice team via email.</p> <p>Q: Can additional training be offered to liberation associations on access to additional funding? A: This is something that can be looked into.</p> <p>Q: Is the WO aware of the changes that have recently been made to claiming for extenuating circumstances if you have a long term medical condition? A: Apologies if the way you had claimed for extenuating circumstances has changed. Although the precise details of the changes will need to be looked into, I think it was intended that extenuating circumstances for those with a long term medical condition is now being dealt with by the Reasonable Adjustments policy, and has not been communicated in the best possible way. Individual cases can be looked into – please email the details over.</p> <p>Q: Can additional training be offered to the Guild Advice Advisers on disability benefits such as PIP? A: In conjunction with the new Guild Advice manager, the services that are offered are currently under review. This includes areas for possible expansion. Your Ideas Update</p> | <p>Following the introduction of the new democratic model "Your Ideas" students have voted to pass the following ideas, which are now being acted upon by the Officer Team.</p> <p><u>Guild Development</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Milkshakes at the Guild – A selection of milkshakes was introduced to Joe's Bar at the start of term 3. If they prove to be popular, the variety of flavours available may be expanded. • Discounted shop on campus – Spar has a contract to be in the Guild until 2019, so they will have to remain the main provider until then. However, we are looking at expanding the meal deal options available and bearing pricing in mind for the new food venue in the Guild too. <p><u>Sports and Activities</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • More live music at the Guild – Work is currently being undertaken with venues to put on a Gig night regularly. We also working with Student Groups to ensure there is society support for this idea. <p><u>Welfare and Community</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • More Water Fountains on Campus – Like the WiFi blackspot map, that went out to students earlier in the year, a similar interactive map that will allow students to say where they might like fountains to be placed, is being launched tomorrow.
